DUTIES

The Industry Guidance Branch (IGB) is responsible for providing legal services to OIG relating to: (1) the issuance of advisory opinions to the public under sections 1128, 1128A, and 1128B of the Social Security Act; (2) the development of the Federal anti-kickback statute's "safe harbor" regulations and regulations creating exceptions to the definition of "remuneration" under the civil monetary penalty provision prohibiting inducements to beneficiaries; (3) consultations with the Department of Justice and OCIG's Administrative and Civil Remedies Branch regarding potential violations of the Federal anti-kickback statute and the civil monetary penalty provision prohibiting inducements to beneficiaries; (4) guidance to OIG's Congressional Affairs office regarding proposed and actual legislation and responses to requests from the U.S. Congress; (5) fraud and abuse waivers issued in connection with various Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation models; and (6) the issuance of Fraud Alerts and other forms of guidance to the public.

The major duties and responsibilities of the Chief of IGB include:

- In association with the Chief Counsel and Assistant Inspector General for Legal Affairs, acting as adviser on all matters referred to above to the Inspector General and her principal officials.
- Advising staff and evaluating the technical accuracy, completeness and legal sufficiency
 of advisory opinions, other guidance, and regulations released to the public regarding the
 Federal anti-kickback statute and the civil monetary penalty provision prohibiting
 inducements to beneficiaries. Analyzing the background of the more difficult and
 extremely complex issues arising from advisory opinion requests and rulemaking.
- Conducting and monitoring research on complex legal questions, issues, problems, and cases concerning the interpretation, application, and enforcement of agency statutes and regulations.

- Representing the Inspector General in complex negotiations, such as negotiating safe harbor rulemaking.
- Coordinating with the attorneys of the Department of Justice and Office of the General Counsel for the Department of Health & Human Services on issues arising from advisory opinions, rulemaking, and other guidance.
- Directing and coordinating the preparation of advisory opinions, regulations (including preamble), and other documents and materials preparatory or incident to industry guidance on health care fraud and abuse issues.
- Directing and coordinating feedback provided by the Industry Guidance Branch to OIG's Congressional Affairs office regarding proposed and actual legislation and responses to requests from the U.S. Congress.
- Monitoring the review and evaluation of factual and legal issues and materials resulting from requests for advisory opinions or matters related to rulemaking and other guidance.
- Developing and using an authoritative knowledge of: major Department programs and activities; the content, precedents, and decisions of applicable case law; civil procedures; and the general principles, rules, and decisions in other related areas of law.
- Providing authoritative legal advice, guidance, and assistance to the Inspector General
 regarding legal and regulatory strategy; legislative proposals; integration and
 interpretation of new and emerging authorities and agency responsibilities under
 anticipated and current regulatory authorities; legal atmosphere concerning issues being
 deliberated and relevant regulatory and procedural information; reviewing documents and
 other materials to ensure legal sufficiency and compliance with regulatory requirements;
 and other related matters.
- Managing, directing, and supervising the activities of GS-11 through GS-15 attorneys and support staff. Making assignments and overseeing the work of the attorneys and, as applicable, support staff.
- Establishing performance standards, evaluating the performance of attorneys and staff, giving advice, counseling and instructing on both work and administrative matters, identifying development and training needs of staff, making recommendations for appointments, promotions, reassignments awards, and scheduling and approving leave.

Applicants must have graduated with a Juris Doctorate (JD) or Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) from a law school accredited by the American Bar Association and must be a current member, in good standing of a state, territory of the United States, District of Columbia, or Commonwealth of Puerto Rico bar association.

Applicants must have at least four (4) years of professional legal experience post bar admission equivalent to at least the GS-14 grade level. Experience may be outside of the Federal Government.

Highly qualified applicants will have significant experience as an attorney advising agencies (Federal, state, or local), individuals, or entities on matters involving health care fraud and abuse laws. In addition, highly qualified applicants will have sophisticated analytical skills, superior written and oral communications skills, good judgment, and experience in interacting with government and non-government officials. Finally, highly qualified applicants will have been responsible for planning, directing, and evaluating work, either in a managerial capacity or in another leadership role.

Experience refers to paid and unpaid experience, including volunteer work done through National Service programs (e.g., Peace Corps, AmeriCorps) and other organizations (e.g., professional; philanthropic; religious; spiritual; community, student, social).
